NVHCP treatment center

The treatment center under the National Viral Hepatitis Control Program (NVHCP) was



inaugurated on 30th January under the aegis of the Department of Hepatology, SGPGIMS, Lucknow. Under the program, free DNA testing for Hepatitis B and RNA testing for Hepatitis C will be done. Free consultation and medicines will be provided to Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C patients. The program aims to combat hepatitis and achieve countrywide elimination of Hepatitis C by 2030. The patients willing to avail these services need to register themselves in Hepatology OPD on Monday and Friday.

The NVHCP center inauguration program was attended by Dr. Brijesh Rathore UP-DGMH, Dean, SGPGIMS Prof. Shaleen Kumar, Medical Superintendent Prof. V.K. Paliwal, HOD Surgical Gastroenterology, Prof. Rajan Saxena, Nodal Officer UP-NVHCP Dr. Vikasendu Agarwal, HOD Hepatology, Prof. Amit Goel, Assistant Profs Hepatology Dr. Surender Singh and Dr. Ajay Mishra. 2 Day modular cascade training program in Tuberculosis

24 March was World TB day and a reminder that TB still remains a very important public health challenge, with India having 27 lakh patients per year, almost one fourth of the total numbers in the world.

The silver lining is that mortality has come down slightly and notification rates have improved. In fact, Uttar Pradesh is the leader in notification in both private and public sector.



As per the instructions of Principal Secretary, Medical Health & Medical Education in the 46th UP STF, NTEP meeting held at SGPGIMS, Lucknow on 21st December 2023, a 3 days State level training (ToT) for medical college faculties to update the NTEP programme

guidelines including training and discussion on:

- 1. Guidelines on programmatic management of Drug Resistant Tuberculosis (PMDT) in India 2021.
- 2. Guidelines for programmatic management of Tuberculosis Preventive treatment in India 2021.
- 3. Training module on extrapulmonary Tuberculosis 2023

was meticulously organized and designed so that all doctors and staff of Sgpgi are aligned and insights from various specialties could be shared regarding TB suspicion, diagnosis, drug sensitivity testing, and management.



CME on Recent Updates in Transplant Pathology



We were thrilled to invite renowned International Transplant Pathologist Professor Parmjeet Randhawa, from the Department of Pathology, Division of Transplantation Pathology at the Thomas E Starzl Transplantation Institute, University of Pittsburgh, USA. He visited our Institute including Kidney Transplantation Centre and Department of Pathology on 11th December 2023. In addition, he interacted with residents and faculty members and gave a thought provocative presentation on "A lifetime of Scientific Inquiry into the intricacies of Polyomavirus BK", in the Seminar room of Department of Pathology.On 12th December 2023, the CME was inaugurated by honorable Director and Dean sir. This CME was conducted in Hybrid mode, and the talks were related to recent concepts and diagnostic approaches in transplantation of various organ systems. It was initiated with a presentation on practical approach to liver allograft biopsy, by Prof. Randhawa, followed by an interesting Case-based discussion in liver allograft biopsies by Dr. Mukul Vij. The Heart and Lung transplantation system was duly covered by Dr. Meera Govindrajan through practical as well as case-based approaches. Prof.





Randhawa further elaborated on his expertise- T-cell mediated rejection, and highlighted his work on application of biopsy-based transcriptomics to diseases of the transplanted kidney. Dwelling into the history- An overview of Transplant pathology practice in India was detailed by Dr. Kusum Joshi. The topic of great difficulty-Banff 2022 updates on problems in diagnosing antibody mediated rejection was simplified and presented by Prof. Ritambhra Nada. An integral component of transplantation-Immunological work-up in low-resource settings was showcased by Prof. Narayan Prasad. The sessions were chaired by experts from respective clinical and pathology departments. With more than 130 delegates and faculty members attending the CME from all over the country, it was a huge success because of tremendous efforts put in by Dr. Manoj Jain and Dr. Vinita Agarwal, Organizing Secretary; Dr. Seema Sharma, Organising Chairperson; Dr. Ritu Verma and Dr. Pallavi Prasad, Treasurer; other Senior and Junior faculty members of the Organising Committee, Residents and Staff of the Department of Pathology, SGPGIMS, Lucknow. 


National Deworming Day

Symposium on Nutrition For critically ill Trauma Patients at Apex trauma centre



Apex Trauma Center(ATC) has a well equipped 14 bed ICU on the first floor where critically ill patients with Polytrauma, head injury and severe orthopaedic injuries are

admitted and provided ICU care.

Faculty members from Department of Anaesthesia in ATC organised a symposium on 23.01.2024 on Recent advances in Nutrition for Critically III Patients. The program was well attended by doctors including Faculty members and residents, dieticians and ICU staff including Nursing officers and nursing attendants.

Dr LK Bharti, Professor, Department of Paediatric gastroenterology, who is also the Nodal officer, Incharge, Nutrition services in SGPGIMS was the Guest Speaker. Dr Vansh, Dr Ganpat and Dr Rafat from Department of Anaesthesia were chairpersons for the sessions. Dr Suruchi from the Department of Anaesthesia convened the program and was the Coorganising Secretary of the symposium. Dr Prateek Singh Bais was the Organising secretary of the program. Dr Prateek Singh Bais made a presentation to educate the audience about recent advances and updates in Nutrition of Critically ill ICU patients. He

emphasized on the need to start Enteral nutrition as early as possible and the benefits associated with it. He also put light on the pros and cons of enteral and parenteral nutrition. This was followed by a presentation by dieticians namely: Ms Amna, Ms Priti, Ms Deepa. They discussed ways of





providing enteral feeds, challenges associated with it along with macro and micro components of nutrition. Preparation and indications of disease specific diet formulas were discussed. Questions and confusions from the audience were discussed in detail. Nursing officers and Doctors associated with critical care shared their experiences and resolved to imbibe the latest guidelines in their clinical practice. The whole program was very well received by the audience and they all benefited with multiple take home messages pertaining to clinical practices.





Indo US flow workshop on PID



During 25th Indo US flow cytometry workshops 2024 on Feb 2-3rd 2024, the Department of Clinical Immunology & Rheumatology organized a workshop supported by Trust for Education and Training in Cytometry (TETC) and SGPGI. This workshop on Primary Immunodeficiency Disorders focused on the role of flow cytometry in the lab diagnosis of Inborn Errors of Immunity(IEI). Eleven persons from different parts of India included both physicians and basic biologists. It was a 2-day meeting with day 1 dedicated to understanding basic principles of flow cytometry and about IEI and their diagnosis by FACS. On the second day hands-on training on basic flowbased tests like Lymphocyte subset analysis, T and Bcell subset analysis, assays for DHR, Perforin and CD11/CD18 and acquisition of the processed tubes in the flow cytometer was given. Later a session on data analysis using different examples was done by Dr Maya Gupta from Indian Institute of immunohematology. Advanced PIDOT tube demonstration was also done in the workshop. The workshop ended with a quiz. The resource persons included Dr Maya Gupta (IIH, Mumbai, Amita Aggarwal, Shivika Guleria and Fareha Unam (all from SGPGI)

Workshop on primary immune deficiency tests for Clinicians

This was conducted on February 9, 2024 before the national conference in the Department of Clinical Immunology and Rheumatology. The resource faculty included Drs Maya, Aparna, Rudrarpan, Anu, Rajat and Amita Aggarwal. In addition, research scholars Shivika, Fareha and Komal helped with the experiments. 7th national conference of Indian society of primary immune deficiency

The 7th National Conference of the Indian Society of Primary Immune Deficiency took place

from the 10-11th of February 2024 at the S. S. Aggarwal Auditorium. The theme of this year's conference was adult inborn errors of immunity and autoinflammation. Dr VM Katoch, former

Director-General of ICMR, was the chief guest at the inaugural function along with Prof Sudhir Gupta, the Chairman of FPID, Prof RK Dhiman, Director SGPGI, Prof Shaleen Kumar, Dr Sagar Bhattad, the secretary of ISPID and Prof. Amita Aggarwal.

The conference was a great success as we had nearly 125 delegates and the hall had 65 persons even on Sunday at 6 PM. The highlight included the Sudhir Gupta Oration by Dan Kastner from NIH USA, known as the father of autoinflammation, who shared insights into his career pursuit in the realm of

autoinflammation. Additionally, Dr Sergio's talk on IKAROS deficiency, Dr Torgerson's talk on immune dysregulation disorders and how to sort out VUS were well appreciated.

The other key features were cases and research papers by students (19 as oral presentations and 74 as posters). Debate on genotype or phenotype first in IEI stimulated engaging discourse. The next day sessions on HSCT by Dr Neena Kapoor and Dr Revathy Raj highlighted the challenges in PID transplants. The conference concluded with a session tailored for students and young aspirants in the field, followed by a PID quiz, providing an enriching educational experience for all participants.

The department of Hematology, organized a 3-day workshop on the laboratory diagnosis of Hemophilia and bleeding disorders for hematologists and lab technicians in association with Hemophilia Federation (India), in association with the World Federation of Hemophilia (WFH) and the Hemophilia Society Lucknow Chapter. This workshop was conducted under the Path to Access to Care and Treatment (PACT) Program of the World Federation of Hemophilia. The workshop was led by Dr. Dinesh Chandra, Associate Professor, Department of Hematology (Lab), SGPGIMS, Lucknow.

Professor Shaleen Kumar, Dean, SGPGIMS, and Professor Rajesh Kashyap, State Nodal Officer, Hemophilia Program & Head, Dept. of Hematology, SGPGIMS, were the Chief Guests of the workshop. Mr. Harshal Kale, Regional Manager - South Asia & East Asia, World Federation of Hemophilia, Mr. Dharam Singh, Regional Council Chairman – North, HFI, and Mr. Vineet Manchanda, Secretary, Hemophilia Society Lucknow Chapter also participated in the event.

The Workshop included participants from all over the country, like, AIIMS Rishikesh, AIIMS Guwahati, AMU Aligarh, GMC Kolhapur, Ranchi and Dibrugarh, AIIMS Jodhpur and DMC Ludhiana. The main objective of the workshop was to educate and provide training to hematologists and lab technicians to set up the diagnostic facilities for bleeding disorders in their respective centers and in turn advance the diagnostic capacities for bleeding disorders within North India. Prof Kashyap highlighted that currently the cases of Hemophilia are under-diagnosed and thus there was a need to strengthen the diagnostic facilities. Prof Shaleen Kumar emphasized on the precision, accuracy and importance of harmonization of these tests. Mr. Harshal Kale stated that increasing the diagnosis of people with bleeding disorders (PwBDs) is one of the key objectives of the WFH PACT program. This can be achieved through several ways, of which building the capacity of laboratories to diagnose PWBD is crucial to achieving our objective. He is excited to bring this initiative to North India in collaboration

with HFI & SGPGIMS, Lucknow.

Advantages of patient centricity

- Early detection & prevention of illness.
- Better outcome & reduce errors.
- Improve trust & satisfaction.
- Personal & professional fulfillment.
- Improved patient loyalty & referrals.
- Increased reputation.
- Greater overall profitability.

What is PAC?

A Patient Advisory Council (PAC) collaborates with healthcare team members, uniting patients and professionals to offer insights on enhancing the overall patient and family experience. Through the PAC initiative, patients are welcomed to participate in hospital committees, ensuring that their perspectives, viewpoints, and experiences as consumers are not only acknowledged but also incorporated into service and quality enhancements aimed at delivering high-quality, patient-centered care.

Why PAC:

Institute of Medicine 2001 report - Crossing the Quality Chasm

- Transformational change in healthcare
- Need to establish new partnerships with patients and families
- Recommended that patients and families be more involved in decisions about their health care v Move towards patient and family centered care mode.

How to form a Committee:

All members will function as volunteers. A minimum of 7-15 members is required for committee formation. Committee members will be selected based on their own interests. Patients will also be chosen randomly for membership. An advisory council could be established at the individual department level or for the healthcare setting. Committee members are:

- Director/CEO
- Administrator
- Clinician
- Nurse(2-3) who are interested to participate for change
- Patient or Family member (3-4), randomly choose
- Quality member
- Co coordinator

- services area members

A charter can be used to justify the need for an advisory council. Use of a charter can help to define and clarify the organization's vision for partnering with patients/families through an advisory council model. The charter is a one page document that includes the following components:

- An opportunity/problem statement.
- Scope.
- · Goals.
- Estimated benefits.
- Timeline with a start date for the first PAC meeting.
- Listing of planning committee team members.
- Engage stakeholders early in the process.
- Clearly define the role of the PAC.
- Find a physician champion to articulate the need for the advisory council.
- Select a coordinator with an understanding of the role of the council and a strong passion for patient and family-centered care.
- Be prepared to explain how the council will provide improvements and how success will be measured.

Select either the seminar room or counseling room as the meeting venue and ensure a written agenda for each meeting. Meetings will be held every 15 days with a focus on healthcare interests. Minutes for each meeting should be documented in the committee file, and action should be taken based on feedback from patients and members. The committee chairperson is responsible for implementing preventive and corrective actions, recognizing that positive outcomes in patient care hinge on valuable feedback from patients.





"Primum non nocere and the Brown Bag concept"

The fundamental principle of medicine is " Primum non nocere," meaning "First, do no harm." This principle is increasingly challenging to uphold in today's world of highly effective yet complex medications and polypharmacy. One simple and practical step toward minimizing harm and ensuring medication safety is the "Brown Bag Medication Review." This process encourages patients to bring all their medications and supplements to their medical appointments or to the pharmacy, allowing clinical staff to review and discuss them. The goal is to help patients maximize the benefits of their medications, identify potential issues arising from polypharmacy and drug interactions, and reduce medication waste. Patients should bring all prescription and over-the-counter medications, vitamins, supplements, herbal remedies, topical treatments, liquids, injections, inhalers, and pills. The healthcare professional can then review these medications for contraindications, interactions, adverse reactions, and compliance. Older adults and those taking multiple medications may benefit the most from brown bag reviews, as they are at higher risk for adverse drug reactions and drug-drug interactions. As per the timeless quote from Benjamin Franklin: "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure"
